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Two ... plus two ... plus one more Ten years of growth turns a house into a home

Approximately 15,000 Pennsylvania children and youths are in foster care, awaiting a permanence that, for some, never comes.

Marvin and Beverly Smith have helped to put a small dent in that number.

Ten years ago, the New Tripoli couple decided to investigate adoption. Now, with five children in their home, including four adopted, they say they could not be happier with their decision.

“We had friends at church who went through Diakon Adoption & Foster Care to adopt two children and they had a happy ending,” says Beverly Smith. “So we decided to go to Diakon’s information night and see what they had to offer.”

Following the meeting, the Smiths began the necessary paperwork. “It really made us think about who we were ... things that we had never even given thought to,” explains Marvin Smith. “It was a long process for us, but we felt very strongly that God was guiding us through it.”

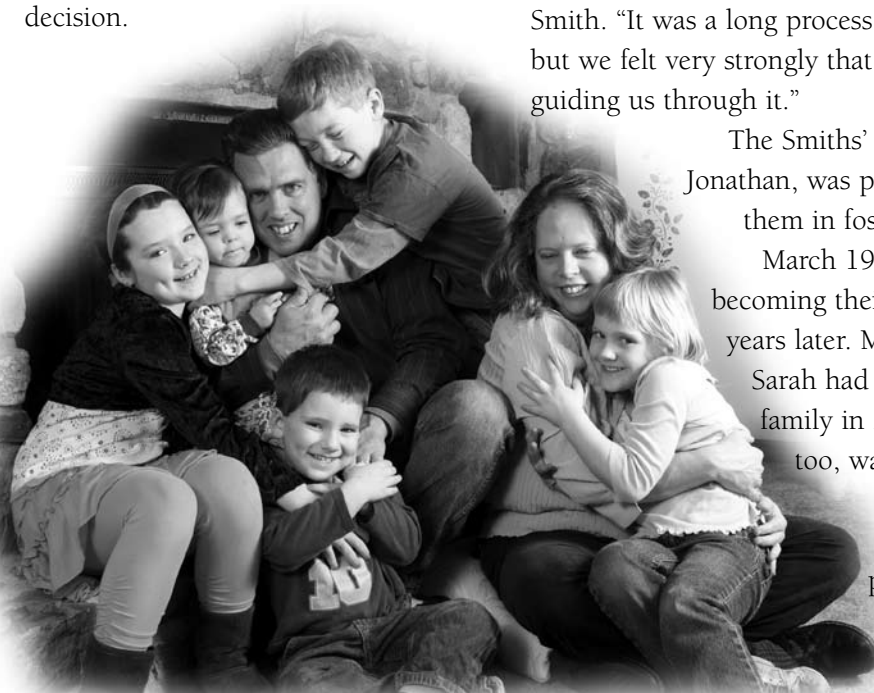
The Smiths’ first child, Jonathan, was placed with them in foster care in March 1999, legally becoming their son four years later. Meanwhile, Sarah had joined the family in 2001; she, too, was adopted four years following placement.

While the Smiths considered their family complete, they had told their caseworker “that if Sarah’s biological sister came into care, we would consider adopting her to keep the siblings together,” says Mrs. Smith. “We were in for a surprise!”

The couple learned that Sarah’s birth mom had had another child, a boy. Before long, they received a call that the siblings were available for foster care.

“We took some time to pray, asking God to guide us. We talked to friends that have four children and our parents to see what they thought we should do,” adds Marvin. “A week later, we contacted Diakon and said we wanted to go ahead with the placement. We were afraid Sarah would not know her

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A look back at 2010

We have a lot to celebrate!

Despite significant funding challenges, declining markets, a decrease in out-of-home placement referrals, and additional unfunded mandates placed on program staff to meet the increased demands of those we serve, we had a successful 2010 by the most important yardstick of all—we were able to serve more people than in 2009, and with fewer staff

members and less funding!

Of particular importance was the fact the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption approved continuation of our programming under the Wendy's Wonderful Kids initiative, with two child-specific recruiters in Pennsylvania and Maryland.

Additionally, Pennsylvania's Statewide Adoption & Permanency Network renewed grant funding for 2011 to continue our Older Child Matching Initiative Program.

And there were a lot of other things to celebrate:

- Nearly 100 adoptions were finalized in 2010, compared with 73 in 2009.
- We received referrals for more than 670 SWAN units of service and completed a total of 737 services, nearly 150 more than completed in 2009.
- We completed 180 child preparation and 215 child profile units of service in 2010, approximately 100 more than 2009.
- We had more than 420 families express an interest in becoming a resource family, while we also approved and licensed more than 100 new families.
- Similar to 2009, we daily served an average of 115 children in foster care, placing 91 new children into one of our resource family homes during 2010.
- Based on our efforts to achieve timely permanence for children in our program, 62% of children moved to adoption upon discharge and 16% returned home. Moreover, 60% of children in out-of-home care remained in placement for less than 12 months and 21% for less than 24 months. Those statistics mean that 71% of children remained in temporary foster care less than 2 years and 78% were discharged to a permanent placement setting.

Such progress is indeed cause to celebrate 2010, despite its challenges.

I want to extend special thanks to the staff, families, and children touched by our programs for their role in making 2010 another successful year. You are among the most important of our Many Hands, guided by One Heart, that continue to make an amazing difference in the lives of waiting children and youths.

She would enjoy a family that has dogs and cats; however, due to her respiratory difficulties, she would do better in a family with no pets. She wants her family to attend church, spend time at the mall, cook at home, and give hugs and kisses. She also wants a family who understands that she may need some space. She does not have a lot of strength in her hands and needs a family who can help her. She loves talking on the phone and wants her family to allow her to have a cell phone.

Program helps to answer questions for youths in foster care

Youths in the custody of a county often find it difficult to understand why they aren't living in warm and loving homes with their parents.

To help them answer this difficult question, a unique program called Crossroads helps them to understand who they are, what happened to them, where they are going, and how they will finally know they belong somewhere.

The Topton office of Diakon Adoption & Foster Care recently began its third Crossroads group with Berks County Children and Youth Services, as a unique way to provide the SWAN Child Preparation unit to youths, especially those who are older, in county custody.

"Several years ago, Diakon began providing this service in a group atmosphere, initially in our York office, with counties in the central region of Pennsylvania," says Joyce Riche, permanency services supervisor. "Starting in the fall of 2009, the Topton office began to provide this service, specifically to older youths who are probably aging out of the system without a permanency resource. We work with the Berks County Placement and Independent Living unit to identify youths who will most benefit from this service."

Typically, the process involves a minimum of 10 individual sessions with an adoption professional, during which the child or youth can explore his or her personal history and the difficulties encountered, in a safe environment and in a developmentally appropriate way.

"By helping the child make sense of a hurtful past, we equip the child to be better prepared to look toward the future," Riche says.

By having the youths meet in a group with peers who have had similar experiences, Diakon staff members are able to help the children address questions, discuss birth families and the youth's connections, the child welfare system and the youth's involvement with it, and the future. Activities and discussions are geared toward youths ages 16 to 19.

"Unfortunately, our youths very often feel powerless, after having been moved throughout the system, possibly for years, without having any say in the matter," says Riche. "The youths in the Crossroads program are educated about their rights as a person in foster care, so that they can begin to feel a sense of power."

Because of their frequent moves through the foster-care system, the youths often have lost many connections. "But by joining with other youths who have had similar experiences, the Crossroads youths make new connections. By the end of the group process, there is a sharing of e-mail addresses and phone numbers, as well as much laughing and hugging, as the youths solidify their newfound connections."

Crossroads, she says, helps to enhance the youths' preparation for having a permanent outcome. "By helping more youths, especially those older kids who have had so many negative experiences, gain a sense of themselves, we can help them be much better prepared for their future. The power of working through their issues with peers in such a setting is truly wonderful to see."

Riche says Diakon continues to be very concerned about youths who "age out" of the system without finding a permanent resource. "Crossroads and similar programs help us work with these kids in an effort to reduce such chronic problems as homelessness, dropping out of school, and possible incarceration, all of which are strongly related to 'aging out.' It remains our intention to continue to provide innovative programs for children and youths of all ages."

siblings if they were placed elsewhere.”

Hannah and Malachi joined the family and were adopted by the Smiths two years later. At the same time, Beverly learned she was pregnant. Faith was born in December 2008.

Mrs. Smith says that the children, for the most part, get along terrifically. “They do have their sibling rivalries, but they love and care for one another.

Each child is an individual with his or her own personality and qualities.”

In the more than three decades since Diakon Adoption & Foster Care was established, the program—which has offices in Berks, Cumberland, and York counties—has placed more than 4,000 children and youths with adoptive families such as the Smiths.

“We are always looking for families to foster or adopt,” says

Kathleen Roach, director of Diakon’s Topton adoption and foster care office. “If children have the opportunity for a stable, loving family, they have a better chance of growing up to be successful adults and less likely to be homeless, unemployed, or involved with the law. The

love the Smiths provide their children is remarkable. And they are open with their children about adoption,” says Roach.

“Of course, our ultimate goal is to make sure all the children we serve have a permanent resource or connection in their lives.”

The Smiths note that “there may be trials and tribulations along the way, but the same thing can happen” with families in which all children are born to them. “The Diakon caseworkers were so understanding and patient with us and are still there when we have questions or concerns. We appreciate all the support, knowledge, and love they have given us over our long journey with them. We must give God and Diakon the credit for creating our beautiful forever family.”

In husband's honor, she helps children smile

Dorothy Mueller smiles easily and often, especially when she shares stories of her late husband, Bill.

As she was searching for a special way to honor him, the idea that she also could bring smiles to children's faces seemed perfect. From that desire, a dedicated fund to help pay for necessary dental care for children served by Diakon Adoption & Foster Care was born.

"I wanted it to be something personal and meaningful," says Mueller, a resident of Cumberland Crossings, a Diakon Senior Living Community in Carlisle, Pa.

Mueller worked with John Allison, major gifts and planned giving officer, to establish the fund. He identified the very specific need for children in Diakon's programs to have financial support for dental and orthodontic care.

"For these children, some expenses are not covered by medical assistance," Allison explains. "There also are challenges with access and transportation to providers. Dorothy's desire to help in this way is a blessing."

Poor dental care presents a host of problems for children, including possible health and self-respect issues.

As Mueller sees it, smiling comes naturally to children—unless they are embarrassed by bad teeth.

"I've seen how children can be bothered by that," she says. "I know how costly and important the care is."

Adoption close to her heart

Mueller's family includes two adopted grandchildren. Her connection to the adoption process is "very personal," she explains, and she sponsored an adoption with a past donation to Diakon. Not only does adoption and foster care need support, she says, but helping others also represents many of the things her husband stood for.

"He was a wonderful engineer," she says, "and a man of real integrity."

Mueller and her husband-to-be met in 6th grade, when both joined the school band. Both valued education and Mueller earned an engineering degree as well as a degree in music education. Bill had a distinguished military career and then headed engineering projects at Amherst



College in Massachusetts. Mueller says they were "professional gypsies," living in many different locales and enjoying "a wonderful life." She settled in at Cumberland Crossings to be close to her daughter and grandchildren, and continues to enjoy a busy life.

"Supporting Diakon Adoption & Foster Care bespeaks well of Bill and his family," she says. "Helping children is a very personal commitment for me."
